Go on, tell me.

John:

I'm teaching myself how to cook! I can make great pasta,

vegetable soup, and Spanish omelettes.

Mum:

#### **David Best:**

Hi, I'm David Best, and I'd like to welcome you to Rose Wood Nature Park. This afternoon I'm going to give you some information about the park and our work, and then you'll be free to look around. I'm a member of the Rose Wood management team, and I've been here since the information centre was opened ten years ago. The centre was built when this area was officially made into a nature park to protect the environment and wildlife. Rose Wood has always been open to the public, and we have visitors from many different parts of Britain, and also from abroad.

This area is important environmentally for various reasons. First of all, there's the lake which provides a home to many important species of birds. The lake used to be polluted with rubbish, chemicals, and other kinds of waste. However, after a big clean-up campaign, the water quality improved, and it's now both clean and safe for birds to live and build their nests in peace. I'm afraid that means fishing isn't allowed.

Another important part of the park is the beautiful forest. A lot of the trees are very old, and need looking after carefully to ensure they stay in good health. In spring, you can find beautiful spring flowers there, so it's worthwhile coming with your camera to take some photos. Naturally, we ask people not to pick the flowers, but to enjoy them in their natural surroundings. These flowers are important because they attract both bees and butterflies, and as we all know the populations of those insects have declined in recent years.

There are many different paths for walking and cycling throughout the park, and we welcome people with dogs too, as long as the dogs are well-behaved, and don't chase the birds! Every month there's a free organised walk with myself or one of my colleagues, around the park. We also attract lots of school children with our special educational programmes.

Finally, it's important that people can relax when they come to the park, so there are picnic tables available, though we don't allow barbecues. There's also a shop, which is open daily, selling books, postcards, and beautiful gifts. We hope to sell a range of outdoor clothes in the future too. However, maybe most

importantly, there's a great cafe, which is open every day of the week. Here, you can enjoy home-made snacks, and delicious cakes. It's certainly not the place to go if you're on a diet!
